THE JEWISH HERITAGE CENTRE

- To develop, interpret and disseminate information on the history and culture of Western Canadian Jewry and to develop awareness of the history, moral and ethical implications of the Holocaust and other human rights violations.
- To document, preserve and share information on the culture and historical formation of Jewish communities in Western Canada. The Centre also serves as an advocate for anti-racism and education on the Holocaust and antisemitism.
- To forge a pathway for the future by preserving and sharing compelling stories and educating the present and future generation
- To collect and preserve the records, artefacts and traditions of our community.
- To present programs and exhibits about the history, experiences, achievements, and culture of the Jewish community.
- To maintain and expand a searchable and detailed database of Jewish gravestones in Manitoba and farther afield.
- To promote the awareness and understanding of the history of the Holocaust through education—reaching thousands of students and educators each year. We address the fact that society continues to witness genocide due to continuing racism and hatred and that we must all be vigilant in opposing racism, antisemitism, and other forms of bigotry.
- Our treasured archive brings our community's history to life through its collection of images, artefacts, documents, and multimedia, including:
- More than 70,000 photographs
- More than 200 bound volumes of newspapers from 1914 to the present
- Oral histories—audio, video, and text
- More than 1300 sound and moving image recordings
- More than 1000 boxes of textual records, maps, architectural drawings, electronic files, and other documents from 1870s to today
- More than 4000 artefacts including religious paraphernalia, medical and pharmaceutical items, military jackets, medals, and awards, clothing; dolls, trophies, sports memorabilia
- Original documents and artefacts from the Holocaust era

The Jewish Heritage Centre of Western Canada (JHC) brings together the Jewish Historical Society of Western Canada, the Marion & Ed Vickar Jewish Museum of Western Canada, the Jewish Historical Society Archives, and the Freeman Family Foundation Holocaust Education Centre.

In early October, we met with the new Minister of Education bringing along Kelly Hiebert, an award-winning teacher we have worked with over the years. After half a century of advocating for a mandated curriculum on Holocaust education, we finally have met with a positive outcome. Our executive director, Belle Jarniewski provided the Minister with a document she elaborated which outlined the rationale for a mandated curriculum. Within a short time, the Province appointed Mr. Hiebert for secondment to Manitoba Education and Training. We look forward to the roll-out of the curriculum for the 2025-2026 school year and our continued support of teacher training and professional development.



We continue to receive donations of artefacts that preserve the history of our community for generations to come. Andrew Morrison, our archivist, has been digitizing many of our materials, thanks to a grant from the Province for the much-needed equipment.

This past year, the JHC published Jewish Life and Times Volume X, he first volume published in fifteen years. The 23 essays focus on the Jewish history of Western Canada and are organized by eight themes: Jews in World War I; the 1919





in Nazi-occupied Thesisalonisi, a city in northern Greece that has been home to Sephardic Jews for centuries, three Jewish mothers wrote letters to the sons who had excepted to Italian-occupied Athens. The letters convey the terrible fear and incertainty that gripped the Jewish community in Greece shortly before the first rain let Thesisalonisis carrying 2,400 people to Auschwitz-Birkenau on March 15, 1943. In all, more than 45,000 Jewish people from Thesisalonisis would make that terrible journey to Nazi extermination camps.

Some 53 of those letters have been compiled into a book – Do Not Forget Me – edited by Dr. Leon Saltiel, a historian specializing on the Holonaust of Greek level




Dr. Leon Saitiel is a historian specializing in the Holocaust of Greek Jewry, He also serves as Director of Diptomacy, Representative at UN Genwa and UNESCO, and Coordinator of Countering Antisemisism for the World Jewish Congress. He holds a Ph.D. in Contemporary Greek History from the University of Macedonia, in Thessaloniki, and has been a post-doctoral researcher at the Graduate Institute of International and Development Studies in Geneva and the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki, His publications include The Holocaust in Thessaloniki. Reactions to the Anti-Jewish Persecution, 1942-1943 (Routtedge, 2020) and 'Do Not Forget Me': Three Jewish Mothers Wirts to their Sons from the Thessaloniki Ghetto, published in Greek (Alexandria, 2018), English (Berghahn, 2021) and Ferenti (Denniel, 2023).



Leon was a Fulbright Scholar at Georgetown University and has received numerous fellowships from other institutions. He is a member of the Central Board of Jewish Communities of Greece and of the Greek delegation to the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance (HRRA).














Education & Commemoration

The Jewish Heritage Centre is recognized as the principal purveyor of education on the Holocaust and on antisemitism through its Holocaust Education Centre (HEC). Each year, we provide programming, education to thousands of students and educators.

In the aftermath of the October 7 attack in Israel, our community faced an increase in antisemitic events. The need for a mandated curriculum on Holocaust education and antisemitism, became even more important. We met with the Minister of Education and the Deputy Minister and were pleased by an immediate outcome. On Yom Hashoah, in the Legislature, Premier Wab Kinew announced a mandated curriculum led by Kelly Hiebert, a teacher we have worked with for several years and the Premier also noted the partnership of the Jewish Heritage Centre.

We also provided tailored presentations on antisemitism to the Winnipeg Police Service and to Manitoba (Crown) Prosecutions.

In January, we partnered with the CMHR to present Leon Saltiel, a Jewish Greek scholar who presented his research on the Holocaust in Greece.

Our virtual Holocaust and Human Rights symposium featured Holocaust survivor Marie Dudeck, interviewed by Michelle Sadowski of the Azrieli Foundation. Marie's memoir was made available to schools free of charge. We were thrilled to welcome some 5000 attendees!

In the spring, we marked Yom Hashoah in partnership with Congregation Shaarey Zedek. The reading of of Megillat Hashoah– the Holocaust Scroll, with Her Honour Anita Neville, Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba as our lead reader as well as the participation of guest readers from a variety of faith backgrounds.

For the sixth year in a row, a student from Westwood Collegiate was the recipient of the prestigious Mina Rosner Human Rights award. Elijah Varghese, a student at Westwood Collegiate, is our 2024 award recipient. His essay is entitled, "Valour in Vain: An Investigation

of Post-World War I Policies and Institutions in the Execution of Soldier Settlement for Indigenous Veterans."

We are thrilled that Sisler High School was the only school in Canada to take part in the My Hometown Project which was launched by the UK Presidency of the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance. Thank you to their wonderful teacher, Orysya Petryshyn who led them on this wonderful journey.

My Hometown bridges the past with the present and enables students to see their own town in a new light as they uncover local links to this unprecedented history. Teachers were encouraged to support students to research the physical space around their hometown or nearby sites with relevance to the Holocaust, together with local maps, historical records, and testimonies, as a creative way to begin the process.

Students were challenged to consider the historical context of local connections to the Holocaust, the impact of the legacy, and why it's important to tell these stories and remember the victims of the Holocaust.

The Project

Over sixty schools from fifteen countries have embraced our challenge to develop a unique project combining historical research with enrichment activities and sharing their work and learning with the wider community.

Ecole Sisler High School supported three groups of students to develop 'My Hometown' projects, exploring the lives of Holocaust survivors who settled in Winnipeg after the war. Students met with the Fink family, the oldest surviving siblings of the Holocaust living in Winnipeg, originally from Poland. They also conducted additional research on Canadian Jewish survivors with support from the Jewish Heritage Centre of Western Canada.

Students learnt how to interpret a variety of historical sources, from local library archives to materials housed at the Canadian Jewish Congress. They were able to develop their interviewing skills when they met with Belle Jarniewski, the daughter of Holocaust survivors and Chair of the Holocaust Education Centre, and they also developed a range of multimedia and film production skills.

One group of students made a dramatized documentary about the Fink family siblings, based on their research and interviews. Another made a film about Belle Jarniewski, sharing details of her family's Holocaust experience and featuring footage from their interview with her. A third group made a beautiful poster, which visually pulls together all the students' research and learnings. All three groups of students demonstrated excellent teamwork and were excited to share what they had learnt with each other. They are now sharing their projects with the wider school and parent community, as well as with other schools in Winnipeg. They hope this platform will further raise the profile and tell the stories of the Holocaust survivors in their hometown. One student commented, ""I've learnt the importance of fighting against racism and hatred of any kind, and of encouraging dialogue."



The Genealogical Institute Report

This year we have continued to update our database and keep it current. We have added reviewing the In Memoriams from the Jewish Post to ensure there is nobody left out of our files.

We continued with our photographing: all new stones added by summer's end were photographed with the help of Bert Schaffer, Toni Berenhaut, Hailee Bloom, and her Mom. I thank them for this.

Our main area of research this year was on the Kurnarsky/Karr/Adelman family. It started out with a couple of questions, and quickly became a larger project. We had questions about the Hirsch Colony, Saskatchewan and Blank's Lake Colony in Alberta. Most inquiries this year were a little more involved in answering than in previous years. And for the first time, we have had researchers from other Jewish organizations and genealogical organizations contacting us. Some of the families we researched include: Nepon, Jarvis, Boroditsky, Buchwold, Freedman, Davis/Hurtig, Kunstler, Linder, Gecht, Pasikov, Feldman, Rice, Gladstone, Bloom, Dvoshkin, Wilder, Robinson, Elstein and Slonim. The enquiries came from as far away as Belgium, New York City, New Jersey, Israel and Ottawa. And I have to thank a few folks who noticed typos or other errors in our files so we could correct them. Thank you to Belle Jarniewski and Bert Schaffer for translation services.

Our plans for 2025 include visiting all the Winnipeg cemeteries as usual. I would also like to see a "Conditions of Use" document be implemented whenever we are providing photographs or other digitized documents out of our archives.

Archives

Chair, Amy Karlinsky Archivist Andrew Morrison

The archive of the Jewish Heritage Centre of Western Canada continues to be a resource for the community. The archive meets Canadian cataloguing standards in archives and all records and new donations are classified in order for the public to access these resources from anywhere in the world. Our archivist continues to support important research for the benefit of JHCWC exhibitions, publications and newsletters. Our archivist supports and facilitates queries from both the general public and researchers from around the world.

This past year we were fortunate enough to access new donations from the Etz Chaim synagogue, the Vickar family and Myron Love among other organizations and individuals. We obtained a grant for digitisation of records from Manitoba's Heritage Grants program. This has allowed us to digitize more than 4000 pages of newspapers in order to complete our record sets of significant Jewish newspapers the Israelite Press and the Jewish Post.

The total holdings of archives includes more than 200m of textual records, 100,000 photographs and 1500 sound and video recordings.

Programs & Exhibits

Chair, Daniel Stone Director of Programs and Exhibits Stan Carbone

The last year at the Jewish Heritage Centre saw a rich variety of programming and early work on an exhibit that is to open in 2025. In the early autumn, we presented our Switzer-Cooperstock Prize to Kenneth Grad. Now a professor at the Faculty of Law at the University of Manitoba, Grad presented his paper entitled Civil Law Alternatives in the Fight Against Hate Speech: The Case Study of the Marcus Hyman Act. On October 16, we presented an evening dedicated to commemorating the life and accomplishments of Roz Usiskin, community and social activist and the first President of the Jewish Heritage Centre.

In November, Professor Daniel Stone (past-President of the Jewish Heritage Centre, presented his extensive research on Holocaust commemoration in Winnipeg from the postwar period through 1980. Later in November, Professor Ralph Stern gave a fascinating talk entitled "Two Streets and A Synagogue: Urban Encounters in Nazi Berlin" which focused on two particular

streets in Berlin, their urban and architectural histories and transformations together with the often-jarring juxtapositions in which Jewish homes and institutions found themselves as the National Socialist bureaucracy embedded itself in the physical and social fabric of metropolitan Berlin.

Two more programs rounded out the year: Digging Up the Holy Land: Reflections on the Archaeology of Israel was led by Distinguished Professor Haskel Greenfield. May's program, "Jewish Personalities in Winnipeg's Classical Music Scene" focused on Winnipeg Jews and their contributions to the local classical music scene. Presenters included Angela Ratuski, Sid Robinovitch and Jim Manishen.

Manitoba Day is annually celebrated by the Jewish Heritage Centre with the unveiling of the Gray Academy art project done in partnership with the JHC. This year, students recreated pictures of Jewish landmarks in Manitoba. Thanks to teacher Nancy Margolis for her creative work with the students each year.

We are hard at work preparing a major exhibit on the contributions by women to our community and look forward to a late winter opening. We are also in the early stages of two research projects: one on the local Jewish LGBTQ2S community and another about local Jewish artists.

We are thankful to the members of the Programs and Exhibits Committee for their contributions to and support of these projects and programs.
